WHO ARE WE?

The Alberta Association of Agricultural Society (AAAS) is a not-for-profit, non-governmental, provincial association originally formed in 1947 that advocates and provides resources for the **293** Agricultural Societies in Alberta.

We are located in Edmonton in the Ministry of Agriculture building (J.G.O' Donoghue) thanks to our strong relationship with the Ministry and their support of the Provincial Association. AAAS is incorporated under the *Societies Act* (which is different legislation than the Agricultural Societies in AB are incorporated under). The Association is governed by a volunteer board made up of 10 Directors - 9 elected from 6 regions, and 1 elected service member director. The operations are managed by a Chief Executive Officer and a management team.





Facilities...

Active living creates a healthier Society. The facilities owned and operated by Ag Societies allow access for Albertans to pursue their passions in sport and recreation thereby increasing their physical and mental health.

Emergency Response

 Ag Society facilities act as emergency relief centers & staging areas for emergency services— e.g. the Southern Alberta Flood and Slave Lake Fires. Many municipalities list the Ag Society facilities in their local Emergency Response Plan

 Ag Society facilities are often the social gathering place in the community for sports, local events, weddings, etc.
