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MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Half way through the year. Time seems to fly by, especially when we're busy. I'm certain all our members have been more than busy planning and executing the multitude of events and programs that take place every year. To the thousands of volunteers that make living in Alberta special, thank you for all you do.

The 2025 Wildfire season has been tremendously challenging once again. Evacuations of people and livestock are significant logistical undertakings, as well as very stressful for all involved. As usual, our members continue to step up with access to facilities and services to support our fellow Albertans. These amazing organizations are nimble, connected, and able to adapt to nearly every situation when required. Thank you for making us proud.

On April 28th, Canada voted and Mark Carney became the nation's Prime Minister. Only time will tell how the new government leader will find success in dealing with USA tariffs, global economies, and provincial government demands. Somewhere buried in the paperwork whirlwind is the Livestock Traceability file. AAAS, along with our provincial and federal counterparts, will be contacting federal departments to ensure the successes achieved with the livestock traceability policy is not lost in the shuffle. We do anticipate the continued support from CFIA and others in the industry.

On April 24th, Agriculture Minister RJ Sigurdson announced new support for the Regional Agricultural Societies. This marked the culmination of advocacy the Regional Ag Societies initiated to gain further financial support. The Minister remarked, "It's hard to overstate the impact regional agricultural societies have on rural Alberta. From event organizing to infrastructure upkeep, they energize folks and bring communities together. This funding will ensure our regional agriculture societies are able to keep up their good work and continue to be pillars of their communities."

Alberta's government is helping regional agricultural societies mitigate increasing costs and plan ahead with a one-time cash injection of more than \$7.4 million. New funding includes \$4.03 million in one-time supports distributed among the seven regional ag societies to help them manage cost pressures and allow them to plan for the future, including achieving more sustainable operational models. It also includes a one-time investment of \$2.87 million to support business transformation projects and funding set aside for a third-party consultant to help with those efforts. This is on top of the continued annual total funding of \$2.8 million for regional agricultural societies through the Agricultural Societies Grant Program.

AAAS has enhanced our government relations partnerships. The association's intent is to gain a better understanding of the perception of AAAS and Ag Societies with elected officials as well as government staff. Our goals are to gain increased support for Ag Societies of all sizes to accomplish their mandate and increase their impact to Alberta's future, both socially and economically. Additionally, to have AAAS positioned as the "go to organization" when it comes to anything Ag Society or rural, as well as supporting AAAS in its efforts to support Ag Societies in reaching their potential. This work has always been a priority for AAAS, and we believe the investment in this initiative will assist in accelerating our success.

Alberta Gaming Liquor & Cannabis released their new Charitable Gaming Policies handbook on April 1st. Many of the concerns expressed by AAAS were addressed in the revision provided. AAAS had the opportunity to present to the Board of AGLC and provide feedback on the new policy document. This collaboration continues, and we believe will continue to provide positive enhancements to support all organizations utilizing gaming funds to support communities across Alberta.

The 13th edition of Alberta's Open Farm Days is set to take place August 16th & 17th. There are nearly 170 unique hosts participating this year and that includes 11 Ag Societies. We are extremely pleased at the continued growth of this important program. We anticipate the provincial wide program will have a significant impact on Alberta and Albertans again this year.

In this edition of our summer newsletter, you will find a complete list of the upcoming fall meetings. These are a great opportunity to gain firsthand knowledge of what is happening in the industry, network with other Ag Societies and provide valuable feedback for AAAS. Once again, the department will be participating and providing valuable information from the government of Alberta and program perspective. These meetings are open to any member of an Ag Society or even guests of an Ag Society. Please take the time to find a date and location that works best for you and join us for food, information, and fellowship.

On behalf of the Board and Staff of AAAS, I wish nothing but sunny skies for your events, warm rains in between, and a summer full of fun and appreciation!


Funding Alert: ASIRP Grant Intake Opens June 23

Power Line Contacts Can Be Fatal


When working near power lines, always remember to stay **7 METRES SAFE**. If you need to get closer or require support from FortisAlberta, call **310-WIRE** (9473).





The Fair and Its New Challenges

The fair in North America has always meant something different to everyone. It's a place to gather with friends and family, to be seen, to create lifelong memories, and to enjoy food, rides, and entertainment. It's woven into the fabric of the communities it serves and brings with it an undeniable economic boost. But lately, there's been a shift-one that fair organizers across the continent can no longer ignore.

Swarming events-groups of youths storming through fairs, creating chaos-have become more frequent, more organized, and far more disruptive. These aren't random acts. They're planned in advance through social media, with instigators sorting out timing, location, and execution. Their motivation? Clout. Likes. Retaliation. Whatever the reason, the result is panic. Fights break out. Bear spray gets deployed. And in rare, alarming cases, weapons come into play.

This isn't entirely new-fairs have dealt with unruly crowds before but the sheer scale and regularity of these incidents today are different. What's worse is that local law enforcement often feels handcuffed, caught between enforcing order and avoiding public backlash over how the level of force that they use is viewed. Young people have caught on and are taking full advantage of the system's limitations.

Fair organizers are left in a tough spot. Security costs are skyrocketing-more scanners, cameras, and patrols—and at the same time, public perception is deteriorating. Word spreads fast, especially on social media. People start to feel like

fairs just aren't safe anymore. And once that sets in, it's hard to recover. Lower attendance leads to lower revenue, and the vicious cycle begins.

To combat this, some fairs have implemented policies like mandatory adult accompaniment for youth after 6 p.m. Others have limited hours, opening earlier and closing before the trouble usually starts. Some are testing mandatory gate admission and ride passes after a certain time to keep the bad actors out. Are these perfect solutions? No. But they're something.

Meanwhile, new tools like AI are being explored to monitor for signs of planned disruptions. Some fairs are also leaning into community-based solutions-like recruiting Cultural Ambassadors from diverse neighborhoods to help engage guests in a more meaningful, positive way. These programs are early in development but showing promise.

Bottom line: the fair must stay fresh, exciting, and-above all-safe. If people don't feel secure, they simply won't come. We all need to take a hard look at how we operate, who we're serving, and what changes are necessary to preserve what makes the fair so special. We've always prided ourselves on being affordable and accessible for everyone, and that can't change. But we can't ignore what's happening either. We need to act-with thought, with care, and with urgency-before the damage becomes irreversible.
